
## What is GENEXT?


#### **Our Mission**

# What does the increasing population mean to Ugandans?

- Land wrangles in communities resulting from shortages of land as there is only limited land available for a larger group of people
- Continued violence and strife revolving around the issue of land ownership still affect nearly every family in the Northern region.
- 650,000 homes have one meal a day.
- 256,700 students who finish tertiary education cannot find jobs.
- High crime rate, underemployment, frustration among the youth, unending involvement of youth in protests and resulting in social upheaval likened to that of Egypt

- Poor quality education. Studies show 98 per cent of P3 children cannot read and understand a story text of P2 level and 80 per cent in the same class cannot solve at least two numerical written division sums of P2 level correctly.
- The population growth rate outpaces construction of habitable homes leading to unplanned settlements especially in urban areas.
- With rising population (high fertility) government will spend 2.49 billion on health as compared to 1.75 billion with a reduced fertility rate (population).
